TRIBUTE TO LUCILLE JUANITA ELLISON MACK HUGUELY AND MILLIE TURNER BRANCH

Lucille Ellison of Cincinnati, Ohio loved the Huguely Family Reunion which began in 1954 in Kentucky amidst farmlands with barns, hog pens, chicken coups, and tobacco and vegetables in the fields. The remaining elders of the branches, children of Matthew Huguely and Amie Keene, were sitting on the front row in the barn. Someone lined a hymn, most likely Johnnie Ballew. Another prayed, probably Lucian Huguely, husband to Madge Reed Huguely (several Lucian Huguelys in the family). The roll call of branches from the family tree was done by Charley Gillispie's mother, Amie Huguely Gillispie (wife of Enoch Gillispie). Finally, the long tables were filled with all kinds of good eating. Then city and country cousins played horseshoes and three-legged races while others gathered a variety of desserts in Tupperware to take home and nibble on for days later. Lucille knew lots and lots of folks and which branch they belonged to.

Lucille served as Secretary and President in the 1980s. Some of her recipes are in the Huguely Family Cookbooks that some of us hold on to. Memories of her candied yams, yeast rolls, cakes and pies still make us smile. Her footprints fell at the Huguely's annual reunions up and down the I-75 corridor from Detroit, Dayton, Cincinnati, Lexington, Richmond, and Berea, and to Los Angeles, Denver, Charlotte, and Columbia, MD which took in Washington, DC and Baltimore.

She would have loved coming to the Ultimate Family Reunion, back to Atlanta where she completed her first year of college at Spelman in the late 1940s and became a member of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority. She had to come home to Cincinnati to care for her parents and never returned to Spelman. She served the AKAs faithfully, a bond that spanned beyond 50 years. Indeed, Lucille took commitments seriously, whether to the immediate or extended families, church (taught Sunday School for over 60 years), sorority, neighborhood, or the bingo and pinochle games she loved.

Lucille left the rest of us July 16, 2010 at age 84. We honor her memory as one of the officers of the Huguely Family Reunion.

Greetings to attendees at the four-family Ultimate Family Reunion in Atlanta, July 2012. I am James Cornelison, the oldest member of the above named branch. My wife of 54 years, Alice Sloan Cornelison of Indianapolis, IN, is still hanging in with me. I asked her to edit these remarks so there's no telling what the final edition will look like.

I am 81 ½ years old and Alice will be 76 on July 8, the last date of this year's family reunion. We're doing well in spite of a new health challenge for me—lower back pain from degenerative arthritis. I've never had pain like this. Alice says it's because I never birthed a baby. The glucosamine and chondroitin that I take daily in liquid form plus a pill for inflammation in the spine have helped me feel stronger and mostly pain-free. I've put the cane down! The physical therapist said on June 15 that I could return to the fitness center starting June 18 and could begin presses with 50 pounds instead of my usual 100 pounds. I've been away from the fitness center for over a month because of the back pain and my inability to stand straight up. It's good to get back to my routine of three times a week for at least two hours each. Of course that includes chatting with the guys and gals, all

old people like me who realize the benefits of keeping physically active regularly. The medicines and vitamins I take for heart, blood pressure, and early dementia work very well. Alice, a retired nurse educator, says I have an excellent memory for old and current content and am less tired during the day. She says I sit too long and am too quiet in the early evening hours, then arouse and read more of the newspaper or go downstairs to tackle my ironing pile. She drives me wherever I need to get to. I don't think a couple of ministrokes should prevent me from driving but she has seen to it that the doctors and physical therapist have taken her side. Boo!!! In my head I know that the reflexes in both feet are a little slow, but in my heart I miss driving so much.

Unlike me, Alice is an early bird and likes to get to the gym by 6:00 AM while I'm still asleep. Her Bible study classes and bid whist time with friends get her out of the house as well as her favorite stores—Trader Joe's, Home Goods, and Costco. A Wegmans mammoth grocery store just opened near us on Father's Day and she promises to take me so I'll see what all the hoop-tee-do in the newspapers is all about.

Additionally, I do a good job teaching Sunday School several times a year to the Men's Class at Concord Baptist Church, Baltimore, where I've been a deacon for years.

On to another subject. We now have two grandchildren instead of just one. We've written of our oldest, Jason Cornelison, before. He was eleven on Father's Day and lives in Elkins Park, PA, outside of Philadelphia. Jason loves to play all kinds of sports, especially soccer and baseball. He began swimming lessons in the infant's class before he was a year old and is an excellent swimmer. He stays on the honor roll and this year took up playing the violin to satisfy his curiosity about how to make more than squeaky sounds from it. Jason's parents, Michael and Carol, are glad that he is mostly past the squeaky stage. His parents read to him before he was born and every night after he was born until he began to read to them before kindergarten while in preschool. Math is his favorite subject, as it was and still is for his dad. Jason's summer is filled with reading, summer camp, sports, video games, and a vacation trip to a beach site. Michael coaches some of the teams that Jason plays on and other teams he has outgrown.

Alice and I plan our annual getaway weekend to Rehoboth Beach, DE, in October for its annual Jazz festival. It's a chill-out weekend, and yes, in case you're wondering, retired folks need chill-out weekends, too, because our lives are so busy.




Scholarship Recipient Majors in Accounting

House.


