Detroit, Michigan to the union of George P. Cobb and Nannie Lee Gentry. She was eldest of 3 children. She was baptized at St. Benedict the Moor Catholic

Church. Her education was in the Detroit Public Schools where she graduated from Chadsey High School in 1938. After graduation, she attended Detroit Institute of Commerce where she received a certificate in secretarial

In 1942 she began working with the Department of the Navy in Detroit as an inspector. She supervised 15 women while performing an outstanding job and received three promotions during her tenure there. Phyllis worked at the Veterans Administration Regional Office for 15 years from 1950 through 1966 where she held various positions.. In 1966 she joined the ranks of the Internal Revenue Service Data Center. While working there she received such awards as Sustained Superior Performance, Special Act and numerous letters of appreciation. She retired in 1982. She was a devoted Detroit resident evidenced by her living on Pennington Drive for over forty years.

After retirement, Phyllis enjoyed various hobbies including gardening, playing and teaching piano to young children including her great nieces and nephews. She regularly played the organ at the church as well as special events. Her first loves were music and her family. She loved talking about and being with her family. She enjoyed reading and listening to Minister/joel
Olsten. Holiday dinners always included her special apple nut salad and homemade ice cream, and showering the family with her melodies of mus

Phyllis was very involved with the Huguley Family reunion serving as the family historian, branch treasurer. She attended numerous family reunions until her health began to fail.

Phyllis believed in being a Christian in both word and deed. As a devout Catholic, she diligently gave of her time and services to her church serving as the organist for Presentation/Our Lady of Victory where she was a member for over forty years.

Even though Phyllis was the eldest, her brothers Dumas & Lillord preceded her in death. Their wives, Emma and Dovie Mae also deceased, were more than sisters-in-law to her. She shared a special sisterly bond with them.
