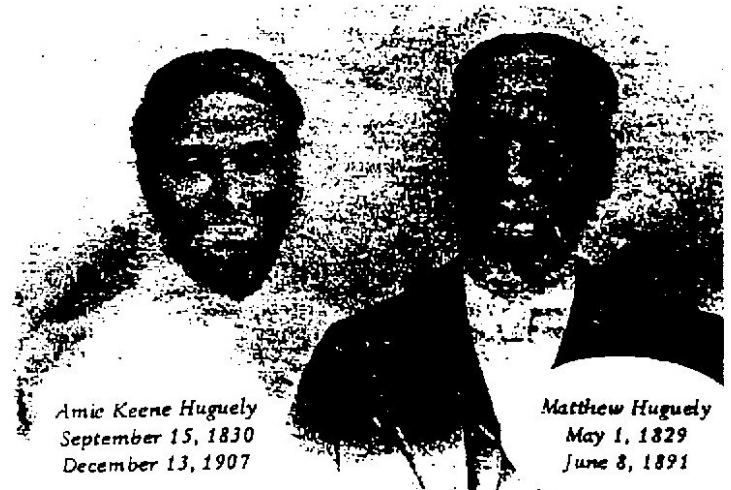

VALPARAISO — A romance that began in graduate school at Eastern Kentucky University will be marked this June when Charley and Del Gillispie celebrate their 25th wedding anniversary.

The couple moved here in 1996 when Charley was named VU's vice president of administration and finance and Del accepted a teaching position in the university's biology and education departments.

They were graduate students when they were introduced by a mutual friend.

"I was a grad assistant in the university's learning lab, and one day a friend asked me 'Del, what do you do on the weekends?' I said, 'What do you mean what do I do on the weekends? I'm a graduate assistant. I study!'" she said, laughing in recollection. "He said he wanted to introduce me to his friend."

Busy as she was, pursuing her science major and involved in her graduate assistant duties in the college of business, she didn't think anymore about the upcoming meeting.

One afternoon, while working with a lab student, she heard a voice behind her and turned around to see the friend and a tall young man she hadn't met before, an accounting major named Charley Gillispie.

They smiled and made small talk. As there was little time to get acquainted, Charley asked her to lunch.

"I think I knew he was special the first time I met him," she said. "As time went on, he became a real good friend and from there it just evolved."

They soon realized they had much in common.

"We were both kids who grew up on a farm. We came from very poor beginnings. We both believed in God," he said. "Del was one of the first in her family that had been to college. My mother had been to college, but my dad hadn't finished high school. Our backgrounds and our beliefs just kind of meshed."

For Del, her future husband's belief in God and the high standards he incorporated into his everyday life captured her attention.

"Of all the people I dated, he just stood out," she said, adding that he maintains those strengths that attracted her nearly 25 years ago. "He believes in God, going to church and reading the Bible. He's one of the most honest people I know."

The couple continued dating through to Christmas break. She went home to South Carolina, and he stayed to complete his final semester before moving to Cincinnati to join Haskins & Sells, the accounting firm that evolved into Deloitte & Touche.

"I think the separation during Christmas made us realize how much we meant to each other," she said. "We talked by phone a lot and wrote each other letters."

On June 7, 10 months after their first meeting in the learning lab, they were married. They now have two children, 19-year-old Christopher, a freshman at Valparaiso Uni-

versity, and 17-year-old Adella, a senior at Valparaiso High School.

The family's move from Naperville, Ill., to Valparaiso has been a pleasant experience, Del said.

Asked what advice they would offer couples regarding a successful marriage, she spoke of the joy of holding similar values such as the belief in God and family.

"And I think trusting and respecting each other is very important," she said. He spoke of devotion, respect and admiration.

"I'm still very impressed with her," he said.
