
JAMES & ALICE CORNELISON

On Sunday, January 7, 2018, James and Alice Cornelison, along with their daughter, Erin, and nephew Kenneth Cobb, attended the 43rd Annual Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Memorial Breakfast in Baltimore, Maryland, sponsored by the Kappa Phi Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., headquartered in Howard County, a suburb of Baltimore. James and Alice regularly attend this momentous event to support their long-time family friend, Cecil Christian, a member of the planning team as well as Chapter Elder and Parliamentarian. The annual breakfast serves as a major fundraiser to support the chapter's programs to promote education excellence and social and public service, most

Before Dr. Ward took to the podium (above right), he listened to a wonderful rendition of "Rise Up" by Jamm Session! vocalist (above left). As he began speaking, he first honored the MC, Vic Carter, who "40 years ago appeared on Raleigh television screens (WRAL reporter), a rare Black face, and inspired many to achieve." Dr. Ward then proceeded to give a very inspirational, moving, and passionate speech. In closing, he requested that the audience look at the program booklet cover (top right) and observe what Dr. King was doing – taking a knee in protest!!! He then reminded the audience that former NFL quarterback, Colin Kaepernick, was doing the exact same thing in protest of the shooting deaths of Black men at the hands of police officers, and that he should also be honored. 

DANIELLE EDMONSON & THE CORNELISONS

On February 7, 2018, Danielle Edmonson, daughter of Maurieta Edmonson, joined James & Alice Cornelison and Kenneth Cobb on their annual trek to see the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theatre (AAADT) at WDC's Kennedy Center. She works at Georgetown University, not very far from the Kennedy Center, and met up with the trio before the performance at the roof-level KC's Café cafeteria for fine dining, compliments of the Cornelisons.

Each year, the New York City-based dance troupe sells out each of its eight performances in the 2,364-seat Opera House during its weeklong residency. The three or four



choreographed pieces that it performs include: ballet, modern, African, Jazz, R&B, and hip-hop dance styles, which illustrate the flexibility and strength (and bodies!) of its dancers, as well as very tender, sensual, and romantic moods.

AAADT is always a joy to see perform, and this was no exception. On that particular night, it performed: *Stack-Up*, *Victoria*, *Ella*, and *Revelations*. The very funky, Soul Train-like *Stack-Up* featured 17 dancers moving to 1970s/80s hits by Earth, Wind & Fire, Grover Washington, Jr., The Fearless Four, and Alphonse Mouzon. *Victoria* featured 11 dancers performing very



interesting athletic movement and ballet, backed by the propulsive driving music of Beethoven's re-written Seventh Symphony. *Ella*, a tribute to Jazz great, Ella Fitzgerald, featured two female dancers moving in synchronized motion to Ella scat singing her 1957 hit, "Airmail Special." And *Revelations*, AAADT's most famous piece that always concludes its performances, is about African/Black folks' spiritual journey and strong faith from the Middle Passage through slavery to post-slavery. It featured 10 memorable and moving Negro spirituals. After an AAADT performance, one often can't help but hum one of these many songs on the way out... *Rocka my soul in the bosom of Abraham... I've been 'buked... Wade in the water...*

Afterwards, on the return trip to Maryland, Danielle was dropped off at her WDC home, safe and sound. A wonderful night all around – great food, phenomenal dance, and Huguely family!!! (John A. Huguely and Mack Huguely Branches)

CARRINGTON VIOT

On February 25, 2018, Carrington Viot and her parents, Jetty Viot and Terri Cornelison, visited the Sandy Spring Slave Museum & African Art Gallery, located in Sandy Spring, Maryland, as part of as group activity with the Northern Montgomery County (Maryland) Chapter of Jack and Jill. The one-acre site in features a cross-section of: Slaving Clipper Ship, Log Cabin, Arts Pavilion, and Great Hall. On such a ship, slaves and other cargo would travel months before reaching their final destination. The one-and-a-half story Log Cabin, relocated from nearby Olney, Maryland, represents typical living conditions for the poor during the slavery and post-slavery years. Slaves and freed Blacks lived in quarters such as these. The Arts Pavilion, built in 1994 and purposely designed like a hut, was dedicated to Nelson Mandela and the N'debele tribe in South Africa. It is the home of over 100 wooden artifacts from the African Diaspora. The Great Hall is the main museum space.





Jack and Jill of America, Inc., founded in 1938 by 20 African-American mothers in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, brings together children in a social and cultural environment, and dedicates its resources to improving the quality of life, particularly African-American children. Every month, Carrington's age group meets for social, educational, recreational, and community service activities.
