Gatlinburg, TN site of 2018 reunion

This year's 64th Huguely reunion, a family gathering that originally began on a farm in Madison County, Kentucky, in 1954, returns to the familiar off-site location of Gatlinburg, Tennessee, as it did in both 1995 and 2009.

Gatlinburg, a mountain town in eastern Tennessee located 185 mile south of Madison County, offers a relaxing, rustic, camping/hiking environment, as well as the roughly 520,000-acre Great Smoky Mountains National Park, Ripley's aquarium, Ober Gatlinburg ski resort, and nearby Dollywood theme park.

Last fall, the Lex-Kin Planning Committee, under the leadership of Michael Runyon, Jr., began planning a very exciting and fun-filled itinerary for the August 10-12, 2018, reunion. Coming on the heels of last year's incredible and amazing reunion in the nation's capital, Washington, D.C., the stakes were very high at topping it this year.

This year's host hotel, River Terrace Resort & Convention Center, offers comfortable accommodations, fine amenities, reasonable rates, and beautiful views. Reunion planning

has come to fruition with scheduled activities including: Meet & Greet, "Minute to Win It" family game, Salt & Pepper Shaker Museum Tour, Sugarlands Distilling Company Tour (where moonshine is made...), Tennessee Homemade Wine Tour, Tanger Outlet in Sevierville, Gatlinburg Scenic Overlook, Mills Park (recreation activities), hospitality suite fellowshipping, and the family reunion picnic.

This year's business meeting that immediately follows Sunday Morning Praise service takes on added significance due to the election of Huguely Officers for the 2018-20 term, as well as discussing last year's family survey (see below) and other important Huguely business matters

2016-18 term ends for Huguely Officers

This 64th Huguely Reunion marks the end of the 2010-18 term for all of its Executive Committee members: President Kenneth Cobb, Vice-President Brandon Durham, Secretary Angelina Huguely, Treasurer Donna Clark, Assistant Seretary Jasmine Higgins, and Assistant Treasurer Troy Huguely (not in photo below). For Kenneth Cobb, Brandon Durham, and Angelina Huguely, this marks their second two-year term of serving (since 2014).



While carrying on the great tradition and legacy of the Huguely reunion since its inception in 1954, Cobb, the reunion's 18th President to serve, and the current administration (Treasurer Emeritus Vicki Mitchell served from 1986-2016) are proud of their accomplishments during their four-year tenure.

These accomplishments include: updated Huguely website, on-line repository of Huguely records and archives (e.g., family tree, by laws, 1870/1880 censuses, newsletters, reunion photos, cookbook, tracked EC action items, survey, resolutions, obituaries, audios & videos, etc.), bi-monthly newsletter updates, additional seed money cities, improved electronic and social media communications, Facebook Page, quiz, crossword puzzle, PayPal account, and successful annual reunions in Lexington, Detroit, Washington, D.C., and Gatlinburg.

Sadly, however, over these same four years, the Huguely reunion lost many beloved Huguely family members, including its three oldest members at that time over a span of 10 weeks in 2015: Mr. Enoch Gillispie (96), Mrs. Madge Reed Huguely (98), and Mrs. Elizabeth Chenault Huguely (100).

Outgoing President Kenneth Cobb will remain in his position as Huguely Family Historian, with his main focus turning toward updating the Huguely family tree for next year's 65th anniversary reunion in Richmond, Kentucky.

All answers are related to the Huguely branches, names, host cities, locations, events, etc.


2017 survey findings



At last year's 63rd Huguely Reunion business meeting in Washington, D.C., as the reunion looked at its legacy and sustainability going forward, a request was made to the Executive Committee (EC) to develop a method to solicit family members' input and feedback on several vitally important topics. These topics included: future reunion locations, reunion duration, family dues, attendee demographics, and dissolution options. As a result, a 21-question online survey, including 13 multiple choice, one ranking, and seven write-in responses, was made available for Huguely family members to express their views and have there voices heard.

The EC's original goal was to have at least 125 family members participate. The more family members who participated in the survey, the more representative of the full Huguely body the responses would be. Unfortunately, only 29 family members participated.



Alvin Ailey troupe amazes

On February 7, 2018, Danielle Edmonson, daughter of Maurieta Edmonson, joined James & Alice Cornelison and Kenneth Cobb on their annual trek to see the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theatre (AAADT) at WDC's Kennedy Center. She works at Georgetown University, not very far from the Kennedy Center, and met up with the trio before the performance at the roof-level KC's Café cafeteria for fine dining, compliments of the Cornelisons.

Each year, the New York City-based dance troupe sells out each of its eight performances in the 2,364-seat Opera House during its weeklong residency. The three or four choreographed pieces that it performs include: ballet, modern, African, Jazz, R&B, and hiphop dance styles, which illustrate the flexi-

bility and strength (and bodies!) of its dancers, as well as very tender, sensual, and romantic moods.

AAADT is always a joy to see perform, and this was no exception. On that particular night, it performed: *Stack-Up, Victoria, Ella*, and *Revelations*. The very funky, Soul Train-like *Stack-Up* featured 17 dancers moving to 1970s/80s hits by Earth, Wind & Fire, Grover Wash-

ington, Jr., The Fearless Four, and Alphonse Mouzon. *Victoria* featured 11 dancers performing very interesting athletic movement and ballet, backed by the propulsive driving music of Beethoven's re-written Seventh



Symphony. *Ella*, a tribute to Jazz great, Ella Fitzgerald, featured two female dancers moving in synchronized motion to Ella scat singing her 1957 hit, "Airmail Special." And *Revelations*, AAADT's most famous piece that always concludes its performances, is about African/Black folks' spiritual journey

and strong faith from the Middle Passage through slavery to post-slavery. It featured 10 memorable and moving Negro spirituals. After an AAADT performance, one often can't help but hum one of these many songs on the way out... Rocka my soul in the bosom of Abraham... I've been 'buked... Wade in the water...

Afterwards, on the return trip to Maryland, Danielle

was dropped off at her WDC home, safe and sound. A wonderful night all around – great food, phenomenal dance, and Huguely family!!!

Their troop, Troop 40035, completed two projects that helped their community, earning each girl a Bronze Award. The girls made blankets for the Children's Hospital of Michigan and constructed a Little Library

outside of their school.

Also, in the month of May, Charlea was selected "Student of the Month" at her school, Canton Charter Academy in Can-





ton, Michigan. Charlea's positive attitude and willingness to help other students were why she was selected. She is also a peer mentor in reading to the Kindergarten class. Way to go Charlea!

On June 2nd, Charlea and Charla competed in Wayne-Oakland Elementary ence Olympiad. This competiinvolved 900-1,000 students from over



30 schools in these two counties who competed in 16 different events. Both girls competed in two events each: Charlea competed in the Water Rockets and Wildlife Safari events, and Charla competed in the Rockhound and Precision Ping-Pong Propulsion events. Their mother, Janika,

was also the coach for the Wildlife Safari Team.

The Water Rockets event involved students creating rockets using one or two plastic 2-liter pop bottles, along with pressurized air and water, in order to launch it vertically from a launch pad as high in the sky as it can go. The Wildlife Safari event featured 65 different mammals known to the state of Michigan. For each mammal, the students had to learn the following: habits, size, prey, unique features,

reproductive cycles, and predators. Rockhound was a competition where students had to learn about rocks. For the







Precision Ping-Pong Propulsion event, students had to construct a launcher for ping-pong balls. Charla sketched her own design and her stepdad, Alex Lile, helped to bring her vision to life. Charla placed 7th overall for her Ping Pong design. Although, Charlea and Janika's team didn't place in the Wildlife Safari event, it improved the school's ranking from 25th place to 10th.

Lastly, from July 16th thru August 3rd, Charlea and Charla participated in a three-week STEM-based program called

"SEEK" (Summer Engineering Experience for Kids), which was sponsored by automakers, Ford and GM, and NSBE (National Society of Black Engineers). Throughout the three weeks, students focused on projects, with a high focus on math and engineering. The goal of the program was to produce a measurable aptitude improvement in science and math, and to provide an experience that fosters inter-

est in the pursuit of science, engineering, and technology careers. Way to go, girls!!!

military ID to show that you are a veteran and do not need a timed visitor's pass to enter the museum and, instead, you go



This past year, Timothy 'Tim' Mitchell, an avid motorcyclist, and his wife, Vicki, attended a few exciting events around the country, including: (a) National Bikers Roundup (NBR) last August (2017) in



Kansas City, Missouri, (b) Black Bikers Week in May in North Myrtle Beach, South Carolina, and (c) National Bikers Roundup in early August in Springfield, Illinois.

Timothy rides a 2002 Honda Goldwing GL1800 (below). Goldwings were 'Made in America' from 1979 to 2009. Throughout his many years of riding, Tim has managed to safely travel the Interstates, highways, and back roads of the lower 48 states to complete (shade in) his motorcycle jacket



patch. In fact, he rode all of the New England states one year. In 2009, he road the light blue-shaded states on the way to the NBR in Las Vegas. In 2015, he rode 16 additional states in six days to finish up in South Carolina for the NBR. And Tim road the remaining western states in June 2016 and June 2017 for a total of 48 states, quite an accomplishment!

Since 2016, Tim has been the president of



his local Lexington Barons motorcycle club, below. Founded in 1968 and celebrating its 50th year anniversary, it is the oldest African -American motorcycle club in Lexington, Kentucky. Tim is seated on lower right.

The National Bikers Roundup is the largest camping motorcycle rally in the U.S. and serves to unite the Black motorcycle community and promote camaraderie. This event is held every August and is sponsored by a group of African-American motorcycle clubs. First organized in 1977 by the Zodi-



acs Motorcycle Club in Kansas City, Kansas, the NBR initially attracted only 49 riders, but has since grown to a five-day event with up to 30,000 participants who enjoy camping, exhibition, parades, stunt shows,

entertainment, and a host of other motorcycle-related experiences, including drag racing and the "biggest gut contest."

The location of the NBR changes every year, however, each decade it returns to its founding city, now with more than 1,000 motorcycle clubs, as well as Black women making up close to half of its participants. Since 1998, the NBR has donated food and money to support local food banks and feedthe-homeless programs.

For the NBR last August, Vicki accompanied her husband, riding 'shotgun.' They arrived in Kansas City, Missouri, from Lexington on



late Thursday, August 3rd. They checked out the round up location that was at the fairgrounds. On Friday morning, Tim and Vicki hit the road to downtown Kansas City to the historic 18th and Vine Street area. They toured the American Jazz Museum and the Negro League Baseball Museum. After walking through all of that great history, they found the famous Gates Barb-B-Q res-



taurant, established in 1946. After eating delicious BBQ, Tim and Vicki made it back to the round up site and walked around viewing all the customized motorcycles, merchandise vendors, and, of course, food vendors. After rain moved in on Saturday, the fairgrounds flooded, which inevitably cancelled the outside activities for the remainder of the weekend at the round up. Since Tim and Vicki stayed in a hotel this



year (and not in their trusty RV home on wheels), they were fortunate to have a dry place to stay. 

On the road... friends, family, food & history

During a recent July 4th week road trip through the southeast, Kenneth Cobb visited Atlanta, Birmingham, Cleveland (TN), Richmond, and Lexington.



After a brief stop in Atlanta, Georgia, Kenneth headed West on Interstate 20 (I-20). Located just south of Birmingham, Alabama, he had a chance to visit with an old college friend, fellow University of Michigan (U-M) alum, and native Detroiter, Greg Scott. Over dinner at the nearby Jim 'N Nick's Bar-B-Q restaurant, they laughed about old times, reminisced about days gone by at U-M, and, of course, discussed current events and issues, solving most, if all of them...

At U-M, Kenneth was the dormitory Resident Advisor (RA) for Greg and his college roommate, Arnett Sanders, as incoming freshmen.



On the way out of town the next day, Kenneth visited the historical Birmingham Civil Rights Institute and completed a two-hour self-guided tour. It is located at 16th St. and 6th Ave., directly across the street from 16th St. Baptist Church, site of the September 15, 1963, tragic bombing that killed four little school girls: Addie Mae Collins, Denise McNair, Carole Robertson and Cynthia Wesley, all between 11- and 14-years-old.

Kenneth found the museum riveting, interesting, and extremely informational. And even though he was acutely aware of many of the historical events of the 1960s civil rights movement, he didn't quite realize that Birmingham was THE central location of most of these incidents and its history: segregation, Jim Crow, 'Bombingam', the KKK, fire hoses, police dogs, children's protests, student lunch counter sit-

ins, 'Bull' Connor, then Gov. George Wallace, forced desegregation, as well as of MLK's famous 'Letter From a Birmingham Jail.' Kenneth was not aware of the two young boys, Virgil Ware (13) and Johnny Robinson (16), shot and killed on the same day as the church bombing.

He also found the interesting similarities between Birmingham's post-Civil War (post-slavery) industrialization via coal

mining and steel factories while paying slave-like wages, and the agricultural boom in nearby soil-rich states that produced tobacco, grains, cotton, etc. using sharecropping practices.



There are many historical figures and significances from Birmingham's sordid history: the greatness of Rev. Fred Shuttlesworth, the proximity to Selma, the election of Mayor Richard Arrington in 1979, and Angela Davis being a Birmingham native.

There is lots of great history found in the museum, which was built in 1988, 25 years after the tragic church bombing. Given Birmingham's history, Kenneth made sure that he 'moseyed on up the road before sundown...:v)



He later arrived in Cleveland, TN, to visit with 'Gourmet Chef' Toni Miles, 'White Glove Princess' Aunt Margaret, and 'Artist-In-Residence' Lucianna.

Before dinner, Kenneth was treated to a very impressive exhibit of Lucianna's abstract paintings, as well as her studio. To date, she has painted nearly 100 abstracts on various sized canvases, using oil- and acrylic-based paints.

Toni, who loves to cook, later served a very appetizing dinner meal of baked chicken, string beans, and salad.

After an evening of laughter, watching TV, discussing Huguely family history, and, of course, eating genuine strawberry shortcake for dessert, Kenneth was escorted to his living quarters and was immediately taken aback by its decor and how pristine, tidy, and orderly its appearance was. You gotta check out



how the bed sheet corners were tucked in... Wow!

The following morning, Kenneth awoke to the sweet aroma of breakfast: delicious frittata with cheese, potato, and veggies... Definitely, Five Stars!!!


Later that evening (July 4th) he arrived in Richmond/ Lexington. Unfortunately, he'd just missed Shorty & Juanita at



responded, "Can't you see that all of us up here are wearing hearing aids??? You gotta talk a little louder! Hell, don't you kids yell all day in school anyway..."










Ex-Bengal honored

Playing the role of a lifetime

On June 22, 2018, Jeremy Cobb, son of Dr. Marcus and Jennifer Cobb, performed in the "Spirit of Windrush, A Service of Thanksgiving" celebration service in Westminster Abbey, London, England. The short drama tells the story of how Caribbean migrants were invited to "The Motherland" to help rebuild post-War Britain. The cast of approximately 15 members (shown below left) performed singing, movements, and narration (see Jeremy on far left). Over 2,000 people were in attendance to witness the production, including British Prime Minister Theresa May.



This event commemorated the arrival of the MV Empire Windrush, originally a German cruise ship, at the Port of Tilbury Docks, located in southeastern England, on June 22, 1948, that brought 492 West Indian immigrant men and women from their Caribbean colonies to live in Britain and to contribute to the recovery of the country from the rigours and devastation of World War II. These Caribbean colonies inlcuded: Barbados, British Guiana, British Honduras, Jamaica, Antigua, St. Kitts-Nevas, Montserrat, Trinidad, Dominica, Grenada, St. Lucia, and St. Vincent. Jeremy's grandmother came to England from Jamaica in the early 1960s and later sent for her young daughter, Jennifer, Jeremy's mother. Thus, both Jeremy's mother and grandmother were part of the "Windrush generation" of immigrants to England.

Following the British Nationality Act of 1948, all citizens of British colonies were accorded Citizenship of the United Kingdom and This first arrival Colonies.

marked the beginning of significant migration from the Caribbean. Seventy years later, its citizens came to give thanks for the lives, commitment, and courage of those original settlers, to celebrate the rich diversity of multicultural Britain in their own way, and to pray that all people

in their land as elsewhere may live together in harmony and mutual

respect. Some of these original immigrants, now citizens, are shown on the right. Hymns including Amazing Grace were played on steel drums as guests, including families of the Windrush



generation, entered Westminster Abbey.

Farewell letter & parting words...

Dear Huguely Family,

As my second two-year term (2014-18) as the 18th Huguely Family Reunion President comes to an end, I'd like express a few heartfelt sentiments...

Firstly, it's been truly an honor and a pleasure serving as your President for the past four years! I feel very humbled to have followed in the footsteps of those 17 Presidents who preceded me, as well as very proud of the Huguely Reunion legacy, tradition, and ancestors who came before me. When I encountered past Presidents during these four years (e.g., Uncle Jim, Felecia, Gerry, Aunt Margaret, Toni, Michael, and Troy), I always knew to whom I was speaking, as well as up against whom my legacy was being measured. To coin a sports phrase, "I knew I had to bring my 'A' game!" Notwithstanding, it's been lots of fun initiating, undertaking, and completing many new projects, as well as making my acquaintance with so many Huguely family members. I found out early during my tenure that as President, if I had an idea, within reason, I really didn't have to run it by a committee for approval. I could just go ahead and do it! What's that old expression: "Sometimes, it's better to beg for forgiveness (after the fact) than to ask for permission (before the fact)." Of course, in most cases, I asked then Treasurer and trusted confidante, Vicki Mitchell, for

I was feeling like Arsenio Hall, "Things that made me say, 'hmmm.'" Fast forward to the next day... All I know is that as of 12:00 Noon that Sunday, following the business meeting, I was the newly-elected Huguely President. I didn't quite realize what had hit me. And I felt like Malcolm X: "Ya been had, ya been took, ya been hoodwinked, bamboozled,..." What in the world did I just get myself into??? Well, in hindsight, it was all good!

Thirdly, I am extremely proud of the many accomplishments that were achieved during my tenure: Huguely website, Huguely information repository, posting of family member obituaries, Facebook page, family organization chart, State of the Family addresses, family survey, Huguely quiz, Huguely crossword, bi-monthly newsletter updates, 2015-18 annual newsletters (including this year's special newspaper edition), hosting of the 2017 reunion in WDC, updated address/e-mail distribution list, tracking of EC action items, and overall increased communications.

Fourthly, I like to give a special



thanks to the other Huguely Officers who started with me in 2014 (Brandon, Vicki, Angelina, Lauren), and those who began serving in the second term in 2016 (Donna, Jasmine, Troy). I'm certain that they will NOT miss receiving any more 3:00 A.M. text messages from me. I'd also like to express a debt of gratitude to my 'Advisory Team' (Toni, Felecia, Michael, Vicki, Shorty). And great thanks and appreciation to my nephew, Randall, for maintaining the Huguely website and for being very responsive and patient to my numerous updates.

Fifthly, even though I will no longer serve as Huguely President (I've been rehearsing my LBI speech: "I shall not seek, and I will not accept, the nomination of my party for another term as your president"), I will remain in my role as the Family Historian and plan to publish an updated Huguely Family Tree for the 65th Huguely Reunion in 2019.

Sixthly, as members of the Huguely family, despite 64 successful years, we all must collectively decide whether or not we want to continue as a viable and meaningful entity. The year-in, year-out struggle and inherent challenge of soliciting and collecting annual dues of only \$20.00 per adult 18 and over often wear thin, especially on any Treasurer...
